1. Know what gets them excited

Which subjects area are they interested in and are good at? What are they passionate about? When they are genuinely interested in the course they're studying, they will naturally enjoy it more and be driven to deepen their learning. Knowing their preferred learning style can also help them perform to their best abilities.

2. Do research

Now that you have a better idea of their interests, start the research exercise by understanding the individual university's profile, such as the university's ranking, profile of lecturers, majors that the university is strong in and lastly, current and past students' experience with the university.

A good start will be the QS World University Rankings 2022, where you will be able to find the information that you need. One good example will be the University of Birmingham, a university partner of SIM Global Education (SIMGE). There are other rankings that will be useful for your research, such as the Times Higher Education World University Ranking and the Shanghai Ranking.

Attend university open houses and speak to faculty members and staff about the institution and available programmes.
